



Information about Sofia

Sofia is the capital of Bulgaria since 1879 and the largest city in the country. The city is one ofthe oldest in Europe being inhabited for 7000 years. Sofia is at the foot of Vitosha Mountain (2290 m) – a favourite hiking place for the citizens and guests.

Sofia is both old and modern with a relatively small centre. Most of the significant buildings – (Parliament, Presidency, City Hall, University, National Theatre, National Gallery) are within walking distance.

Sofia is a green city, with trees lining the streets and several parks in the centre. The city has viable public transport, with the metro being the most convenient transport from the airport to the centre. Taxis are available and there is a wide choice of restaurants, bars, and clubs in the broad centre.

In September the weather is mild, with a little chance of rain and the average maximum temperature is around 23 degrees Celsius.

Venue Information



The conference is hosted by Sofia University – the oldest higher education institution in Bulgaria. The rectorate building, where the event will take place, is an architectural landmark with 36 000 sq. m. of floor space, 324 rooms, including 65 auditoriums with 6000 seats in the ideal centre of the city.

The halls that will accommodate the participants are comfortable and cosy – study halls of several humanities faculties located in the central building imbued with the traditional academic spirit. The opening of the conference and keynote presentations will be in the University's formal Aula.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Sofia University St. Kliment Ohridski is easily accessible by public transportation. The main building of the university (the Rectorate) is located near the metro station "Sofiiski Universitet Sveti Kliment Ohridski" on line 1. You can also take trams 12, 22, or 20 to the stop "Sofia University" or buses 94, 280, or 306 to the stop "Sofia University".

How to travel and reach the venue: from Sofia Airport to City Centre

If you arrive at Sofia International Airport, you can take a taxi, a bus or the metro to the city centre.

A. Metro

Sofia Metro Line 1 connects Sofia Airport to the City Centre and provides direct connection from the airport to the large residential complexes in close proximity. The journey time from Sofia Airport to the City Centre is approximately 20-25 mins. The other Metro stations allow convenient transport connections to bus or trolleybus lines of the city transport system. The metro trains on the route to the airport operate from 5:30am to midnight on weekdays and weekends/holidays.



The metro station is located in the eastern part of Terminal 2 of the airport. You can reach it by following the floor markings in blue at the public area of Terminal 2. The metro line will take you to the city centre and venue (stop named "Sofia University").

Ticket machines for metro tickets are located at Sofia Airport Metro Station. The ticket machines accept Bulgarian banknotes and coins, and one of them accepts credit cards as well. The ticket price is 0,80€.

B. Bus

84 and 184 bus routes connect City Centre (Gen. Gurko Str.) with Sofia Airport Terminal 2 and Terminal 1. Then it goes back along Christopher Columbus Blvd. - Tsarigradsko Shose Blvd. to Gen. Gurko Str.

Arriving on Terminal 1, you can take bus 84. Arriving on Terminal 2 you can take bus 284. Both bus routes operate under an all-day timetable. The exact times, including the first and last buses, are published at the Urban Mobility Centre. The journey time from the first to the final stops of 84 and 184 bus routes is approximately 45 mins. on weekdays, and 35 mins. at weekends/holidays.

At Sofia Airport you can buy tickets for the public transport at the kiosks of Urban Mobility Centre or at Newsletters' kiosks in the public areas of Terminal 2, as well as from a ticket vending machine, installed at Terminal 1 Arrivals public area. The machine works with Bulgarian levs and coins and the issued tickets are valid for bus lines 84 and 184. The ticket price is 0,80€.

C. Taxis

Taxis are available at the airport and the ride to the city centre takes around 30 minutes. They would charge approximately 15–20 € from the airport to the centre. We advise using the official taxi service "OK Supertrans". You can request the service at the offices of OK Supertrans in the Arrivals of Terminal 1 and Terminal 2. The floor markings in yellow will lead you to the taxi stand area.
